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

As to deep plowing that depends on the soil. In all my observation for forty years on eight or ten different kinds of soil in different States, I never saw any seeming good come from deep plowing, unless in gardens where four times as much manure was applied as we could spare for our fields. The richness of our natural soils comes from decayed wood leaves and grass; this is on the surface; the first crop of wheat on our new lands without plowing is the best; when the land is plowed this decayed vegetable matter mixes with the dirt and forms a soil plow deep. Should the earth be plowed deeper this deearth, and the surface soil is less rich. We have seen that the best wheat is grown when all the richness is on the surface, and the largest crops of corn are grown in South Jersey, by plowing three or four inches deep. The


