sories with the main figure, as many do, on the plea of "preaching Christ," is to destroy the picture itself. All the perspective is thus obliterated; marvellous story is wrested from its connection with time and place and personage, and transferred to the airy realm of the imagination. The language is supposed to have a different meaning from that which it seems to express And accordingly the expositor, rejecting the aids of grammar and exegesis, interprets Scripture by the surmises of an inventive and dextrous fancy, and so in effect creates a Bible of his own. This is not preaching Christ at all; rather is it not preaching one's self instead of Christ? Is it not an appeal to the congregation to admire one's skill in discovery and invention? Such irreverent handling of the sacred Oracles is not permit ted to any one, however gifted. The preacher of the Gospel is an ambassador who must confine himself to the message he has received fro the Heavenly King. And his own ingenious allegorizings and spiritualizings of the inspired Record are no part of the message with which he is and the testimony. Hence the doctrine inculcated must not only be true, but it must be in the text, and it must be there because God put it there. Man has no more right to add anything to the Divine teaching than he has to take anything away.

There will, no doubt, always exist some differences of opinion as to the typical character of certain objects and personages of Scripture. But when everything is made typical, the proper Scriptural types lose their dignity, as a king would be virtually dethroned were all his subjects crowned and sceptred with the same authority as his own. And the wild conceits which are sometimes interpolated into a text or parrative, as its spiritual meaning, may hide the very truth or fact which it was intende to communicate. 
