These two are the only verstons of the Scriptures in Burmah The American Bible Society refuses to give these versions the benefit of its co-operation in printing and circu

lating them. They refuse this co-operation on the ground that both versions render baptico into vernacula-Burmese and Karen words signifying to plunge, dip, immerse. In every other respect the versions are admit ted to be faithful, scholarly and idio-

matic. But the American Bible Socicty virtually says that it would rather the Burmese and Karens should have no Bible than to have one with baptizo thus rendered. Baptists believe such a refusal to be unjust to the truth and to the people of Burmah, and for this
