BIRMINGHAM CHURCHES.

SOUTH SIDE.—Pastor Hale preached in the morning on the seventh commandment, in connection with 1 Cor. 6:20. "Glorify God in your body." At night on "making shipwreck of faith." One under watchcare. Contributions for new church building in slow.

WOODLAW.—Pastor Adams preached at both services. Fifty in Sunday-school.

FIRST CHURCH.—The day was damp and cold and muddy, but Sunday-school and church were well attended. In the morning the pastor preached from 1 Cor. 1:8: "Christ's confirming the Christian." 2: "The blameless life in Christ." 3: "The ability to stand the test in the day of Jesus Christ." At night, fine congregation for the night subject: "The unshaken purpose of Paul." Acts 20:24. Fine interest at both services.

EAST LAKE.—Pastor preached at both services. Bad weather prevents large attendance at Sabbath-school or church service. Meetings were solemn.

RESEARCH.—Two enjoyable services yesterday. Pastor made his first annual report. Baptized during the year eighteen, received by letter twenty-one. Church raised during the year, for all purposes, \$1,244.61, of which Ladies' Aid Society raised \$119, by Little Helpers \$51, and by Sunday-school \$70.35. One baptized at night from the Catholics. This was a very clear case of a change on principle.

FROM THE SEMINARY.

Hurrah for Missouri! she is in the lead, having the greatest number of students in attendance—about twenty-five. Kentucky, Texas, Virginia and South Carolina have each a goodly number. Mississippi has only four and Alabama five present; but there are about the same number of students present as usual. As regards sociability and spirituality, the students are ahead of the average, so many say.

The friends of the institution are doing all they can to perfect it in every sense. In addition to elocution being taught here, a professional music teacher is employed to teach singing publicly for twenty minutes and privately an hour every Tuesday and Friday nights.

There is also a fine gymnasium in the building, where two classes in the building, where two classes are taught each day by two students, who are thoroughly competent to instruct in this line.

Dr. Broad has been quite anxious to interest the boys in gymnastic exercises, knowing the importance of physical exercise in connection with mental. Most of the students attend one or the other of these classes, but many prefer to take walks. In addition to this, many feel the need of more vigorous exercise. They find in foot-ball, which comes just after dinner, and generally lasts from 1:45 till 2:30 o'clock. Some get hurt, but take it all right, as it was in play.

The boys have a prayer service every morning for fifteen minutes before breakfast, and on Thursday nights they have their weekly prayer meeting, which lasts about an hour. The morning meetings are usually poorly attended, as many only get ready for breakfast, while the weekly meetings are largely attended and universally enjoyed by the students. Once a month the weekly meeting is made missionary in its nature. The last one was ably led by Bro. T. J. Martin, of Texas.

The first day of every month is missionary day and no recitations are heard. The day, from 10 a. m. till 1 p. m. is spent in reading essays delivering addresses on some missionary field; this being done by the students appointed at the previous meeting by Dr. Manly, president of the missionary society. The Mormon question was discussed at the last meeting of Bro. Forward, a strong young brother from Salt Lake City.

This is a grand institution. May the day come when it will reach every preacher in the country.
