Then certainly the old proverb will prove its own wisdom: "Surely in vain the net is spread in the sight of any bird."

There is no music in the sadness. It is the wild wailing of the winds on a barren coast. The nests are empty, but the birds have not flown. They are all dead, the victims of ruthless hands. Infidel hopes like the birds killed in the nests by bad boys, are cut off before they soar. Ah! poor birdlings of an hour, they shall never soar. Doomed to die soon, their leafy cradle is their tomb. Earth was never made to be the tomb of the Christian's hope. No leafy bower this side of God can hold a beloved John or Paul when once the mortal is shaken down from this tree of immortality. You can write glowing eulogies on such characters, but the poor dying infidel blights the flowers even that are planted on his tomb.

See this flower on the tomb of Barrett. Barrett was one of Shakespeare's greatest interpreters. Robert L. Ingersoll placed the flowers upon his grave in that glowing eulogy uttered a few days ago. Meant for a eulogy, they are soon turned to Sodom apples, and ashes on the lips of grief. Hear the sad refrain:

"One by one the players leave the stage, and others take their places. There is no pause. No one knows what the next scene is to be. Will this drama have an end? Will the curtain fall at last, and will it rise again on some other stage? Reason says, Perhaps; hope still whispers, Yes. Sadly I bid my friend farewell." How different this from Paul. No murky, cloudy evening falls about him. No shadow of even a "perhaps" is on him. He exults, he sings, he rejoices in his victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Ingersoll's wreath on the grave of his friend Barrett is dying already. Paul's is still living and will live on. With the one tears turn into stones on a barren beach, and friends are changed into konk shells, whose life is long since gone. Paint their memories as you may, they are only lifeless shells on the shore of agnosticism. But with the other, tears transform on the face of parting are transformed into diamonds which contain all the glories of the heavenly spectrum. There are rainbows in these tears. The spanning the ark of eternal peace and safety. Poor Ingersoll! Put his agnosticism back where Paul's Gospel started, and the art, literature, science, civilization of the world to day would be a tedious sea of death. The proof of the pudding is in the eating. Agnosticism is a dreadful miasma, while Paul's Gospel of the Resurrection is the heavenly tonic needed to bring out the trooping glories of the spring tide of hope. The victory song of Paul is more sweet, more calm, more sympathetic, more scientific, more soul like than Ingersoll's lament or the swan-like refrain of the dying agnostic.
