At the Mobile association most of them were compelled to remain, as there were about forty miles of water between them and their homes.

Pilgrims on a Spree.

I have a conviction, and am sorry to say, a growing one, that the church is losing her strength—certainly her efficiency—through worldly affiliation. Her fair garments are soiled by close contact. She gives but borrows none. With noble exceptions, she meets the world more than half way, a good deal, compromises integrity without receiving an equivalent. As to that there is no equivalent for the sacrifice of integrity. True, if the world is to be saved the church must of course mingle with it, but not by adopting its maxims or breathing its spirit. A common remark is that, in order to lift the world into the church, the church must go down into the world. A greater or more fatal mistake can hardly be made. The simple fact is that, instead of lifting the world by going into it, the church is sure to be dragged down.

We have reached the stage where the church needs to pause and take observations. The silent drifting is the dangerous thing, and the exposures of the church are great. The ship may be safe in the water, but not if the water gets into the ship. Said Dr. Gordon: "I do not fear that my church will go to the theater half as much as I do that the theater will get into my church." We might add: If the church gets into the theater, the church will certainly and soon get into the theater. But the young people must have amusements; to reach and hold them, they must be entertained. Yes, but does this justify church members in patronizing theaters, ball rooms, billiard saloons, card tables, and all sorts of gymnastic performances? Will this uplift or drag down the young?

Let me say the church was not organized to furnish entertainments for its members, either old or young. The world furnishes these to order, and plenty of them. True, we need seasons of relaxation, recreation, and suitable provision should be made for them; but when these pass into a craving for mere animal excitement it is time to halt, for then indulgence only increases and intensifies the desire. In the line of entertainments it is curious and significant to note the drift of evangelical churches. "To raise funds," "to reach and hold the young,"—these phrases are too often employed as mere catchwords, to cover and conceal the real intent. As a rule, that which has precedence and which really is uppermost in thought is the good time. Then what is over and above goes for benevolence. Clippings of printed notices the past year, prepared by the churches or circles connected with the churches, if grouped and read, would astonish many and grieve more. No doubt faithful, devoted Christian workers, who sincerely desire to do the right thing, both in reaching the young and raising funds, are sometimes tempted to adopt practices which bring reproach upon the church and greatly weaken her power for good. I have been at some pains to collect printed notices of these practices under the auspices of the churches, thinking that a bird's eye view might show the trend of the churches in this direction. The quotations follow are literal quotations from secular papers, and within the past year. A few, as specimens, read in this wise: "The ladies' circle of the Congregational church in... served tea on Thursday evening at six o'clock; tea was followed by the entertainment, 'Who Killed Cock Robin?' A butterfly tea; fifteen young ladies covered with butterflies served." The same church advertised a sewing match by young ladies, members of a Bible class, taught by an officer of the church, the young ladies marching in with their saw horses on their shoulders; the best sawyer receiving a book; the worst, a bottle of Mrs. Winslow's Soothing Syrup.

Under the auspices and with the sanction of prominent churches—evangelical churches in this Puritan state—I find advertised "A crazy supper—actors imitating in dress and behavior the insane." "A dumb bell drill; an excellent exhibition of high kicking and tumbling." At a church fair in Essex county, men were blind folded and allowed to kiss the women at fifteen cents apiece. The published account stated that one man kissed his wife seven times and when he was certain the base deception, demand the return of his money, and go.

At a church entertainment one performance was "a lady from Canbridge; a baby drill, accompanied with songs and choruses." A Methodist fair for the benefit of the church is advertised "to close with a broom drill by forty two young ladies and a musket drill by the Sons of Veterans." At the church Thursday evening, there will be a missionary ball and bazaar. Gentlemen are requested to secure their partners in the evening before the oysters and ice cream are all gone." And finally comes the notice with heading in glaring capitals, "HARE AND HOUNDS"—Two young men connected with—church represented here, and others (names given) represented a pack of hounds the pastor acting as master and starter. The hares were started at 2:35, and five minutes later the hounds were sent off on the trail. Distance about nine miles, and the time one hour and forty minutes. The hounds kept well together throughout the run, and the first to arrive was awarded a silver medal.

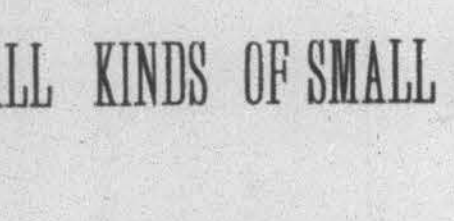
