Invite speakers from other neighborhoods, if you think it will add to

Temperance Clubs. At these meetings call for signatures to form a temperance club. After the club is formed, having adopted a few simple bylaws, let them arrange for future public meetings. In the meantime from private contributions, forward immediately to Prof. Howard Griggs, at Montevallo, something to defray the expenses of the committee. Let the chief by-law be: "We pledge ourselves to work for the enforcement of present liquor laws, and for prohibition in every way that is honorable.' When the committee settle upon a place to meet and a plan to organize, let every club elect one or more delegates. Elect those who will go, and who will be of service while they are there. Raise the money by public collections or by private appeal to pay the expenses of your delegates.

Some man or woman will read this who is able to send five dollars to the commit tee; don't wait for the club to be organized but send it once. In some communities clubs will not be formed because of the indifference of the people, or because of opposition-let some earnest man go to the meeting, when called, and represent that ness with which he met death, and his glo-


